

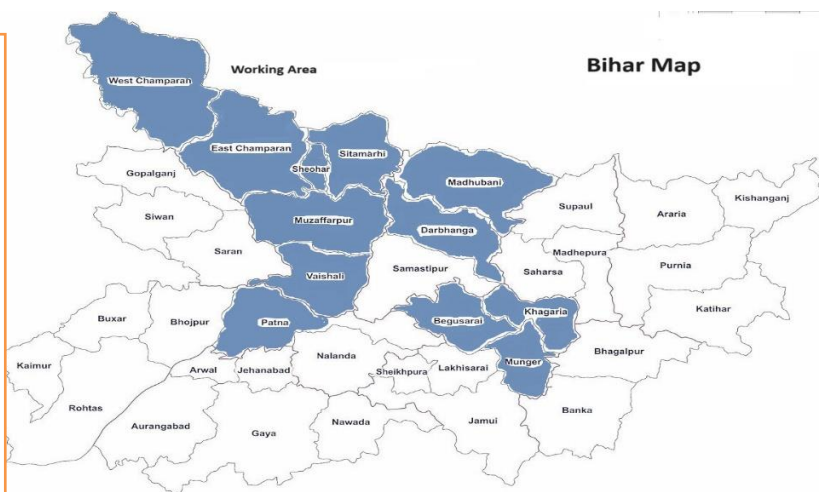

SECRETARY KE KALAM SE

On behalf of our organisation NIRDESH, I am pleased to present our Annual Report for the fiscal year 2023-24. This report encapsulates our achievements, challenges, and the impact of our collective efforts in advancing our mission to reach to the bottom-line communities with developmental programs & services for all round transformation that positively impact their Lives.



We successfully implemented several developmental programmes in the sectors like rural development, sustainable income enhancement, skill development and employment, mother & child health including prevention from HIV/AIDS, girl child education and child protection. 685 beneficiaries engaged in on-farm and non-farm activities, 651 farmers supported with farming tool kits, seeds, solar-based irrigation facilities, organic/vermin compost facilities followed by trainings and thus enhanced their income. we worked closely with health administration to strengthen the rights from district to village level so that all marginalized, disadvantaged, excluded communities utilize quality services. Preventive, protective and prolonged life measures have been consistently taken among 1331 high risk groups, 18469 bridge population, 20014 vulnerable population and 8495 people living with HIV/AIDS in Darbhanga, Sheohar, East Champaran and West Champaran districts with the aim to free districts from HIV/AIDS by 2030. Mother and child healthcare along with adolescent girls have been prioritised and in the past one-year, 5624 mothers, 23068 children up to 5 years, 9790 adolescents and 6018 eligible couple's health conditions improved. Moreover, 67 high risk pregnant women were taken into intensive care and had safe delivery, 94.4 % women had institutional delivery, 1536 malnourished children recovered good health.

68 learning centres in Patna and Madhubani districts continued providing special learning support along with teaching & learning materials (TLM) to 2040 school girls. Moreover, 60 soak-pits near handpumps, 02 middle schools converted to Model Schools with smart digital class, science laboratory and library and 12 Model Anganwadi centres and 02 HWCs established and upgraded.

Our outreach efforts through programmes reached 1,22,686 direct beneficiaries impacting the lives of 4,90,744 individuals. Purposely, we partnered with Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Department of Social Welfare/State Child Protection Society, Government of Bihar, Bihar State AIDS Control Society, The HDFC Bank Limited, The ITC Limited, The LIC Housing Finance Limited, The IIMPACT, The Childline India Foundation and The Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation, for trust worthy partnership.

Our impact assessments across programmes reveals that engagement of rural stakeholders from different sectors directly enhanced targeted beneficiaries' monthly income raising the standard of living from low standard to an acceptable standard. Looking ahead, we are committed to reach to the deprived communities from all walks of lives particularly women, children, girls, youths, farmers, across intervention districts and hope to extend works in nearby states with developmental programmes.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Department of Social Welfare/State Child Protection Society, Government of Bihar, Bihar State AIDS Control Society, The HDFC Bank Limited, The ITC Limited, The LIC Housing Finance Limited, The IIMPACT, The Childline India Foundation and The Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation whose unwavering support has been instrumental in our success. NIRDESH INTRODUCTION

The organisation came into existence on 05.08.1995 under Societies Registration Act XXI, 1860 with the motto to uplift women communities from marginalised, deprived and under privileged sections of the societies. It started working in the home district among rural marginalized women uniting women at SHG platform, from where they have the liberty to acquire knowledge, leadership skill, entrepreneurship and access to microfinance for business enterprises owing to financial control. As time wheel moved on more than 27,000 SHGs with about 3,50,000 members are flourishing across 2 states. Presently, thousands of SHGs members are engaged in varieties of economic activities. Moreover, hundreds of them are part of Panchayati Raj Institutions. Consistent handholding support by this organization enabled them dialogue with government stakeholders and policy makers and insisted government to bring acts/policies that are beneficial for women community and are pro poor. Earmarked contribution by Elected Women Representatives & SHGs in collaboration with government are Acts/ policies preventing women violence, alcohol production and sale, child labour, child marriage and dowry system. These Acts/Policies have positively impacted thousands of lives of women and children. Prohibition of alcohol in Bihar has drastically improved the living status of women and children, reduced domestic violence and controlled underage child marriage to great extent.

Improvement of community health began from Training to AWWs, Reproductive Child Health, HIV/AIDS related thematic programmes bridging the gap between community and health services. These provided healthcare services to 14,86,135 people. To end modern slavery or child labour from Bihar and to serve the distress children in the locality, the organization has been closely working with state and district administration in collaboration with Social Welfare Department/State Child Protection Society and District Child Protection Units under the flagship programme Integrated Child Protection Scheme. **It is based on cardinal principles of “protection of child rights” and “best interest of the child”.** 23,506 children protected from distress situation and mainstreamed with education and social protection. And to support government initiatives for ensuring free and quality primary education to all children in the age group of 6-14 years under RTE Act, 2009 with special thrust on education to girls from Dalit, Mahadalit and Minority communities, the organization is running 68 Learning centres in selected blocks of Patna and Madhubani districts. Girl Child Education programme also implemented in Muzaffarpur, Sitamarhi and East Champaran districts. Approximately, 68,585 girls and boys are in school education net. About 80% of them has passed 10th Class. 23,670 women (90%) and 2,630 men (10%) have received skill development through Jan Shikshan Sansthan of which 69% are employed. As regards to individual enterprise about 6,500 women are engaged in goat rearing, poultry, dairy and milk processing, small trading shops like grocery, cosmetics items, vegetable vending, food processing units, tailoring, beauty parlour, plumbing and sanitation, electrical shops etc.

Holistic Rural Development Programme (HRDP)

The organization collaborated with the HDFC Bank Limited to economically empower vulnerable communities of the Bachhwara block of the aspirational district Begusarai through Holistic Rural Development Approach. Purposely, the 15 most vulnerable villages were selected and rapid rural assessment done to identify areas in which improvement is needed. Based on need-assessed sectoral areas identified for the all-round development of marginalized communities with especial emphasis on sustainable income generation, promotion of farmers-income by applying advanced scientific methods, advanced agricultural toolkits, solar-based irrigation-facility, promotion of intensive vegetable cultivation and other cash crops and high-yielding hybrid seeds, manures, women led enterprises, employment generation, youth skill development and promotion of school education through smart class, library and laboratory, learning exhibition, renovation of schools and Anganwadi centres. It also promoted improved health of mothers, children and adolescent girls through health camps, development of Poshan Vatika and adoption of hygiene, use of toilets, safe drinking water etc.

Setting up Solar Based Group Irrigation System	3	3	Solar irrigation pumpset installed in Rajapur Ragho, Chiranjiwipur and Rasidpur with motto to provide regular irrigation to farmers through Irrigation committee. The user groups provide maintenance charges for irrigating fields. Total 61 acres of land are irrigated. The farmers with this support are growing different varieties of vegetables throughout year and higher value vegetables are sold in the market resulting enhance income of farmers and all the lands are now cultivated.
Setting up of Farm Field School	3	3	There are 03 Farm Field Schools established in 03 villages (Chakdilar, Chiranjiwipur & Rasidpur). All these units are furnished with green sheds measuring (20x20 ft.), Azola Pit, vermin compost pits, waste discomposure preparation of organic pesticides, tray for developing nursery, polythene sheets for mulching, seeds & plants for developing nursery. These units are demonstration purpose for the farmers in and around the villages. 250 farmers in the locality are visiting the units and minutely observing the activities and sharing their opinion with other farmers.
Creation of tool Bank at Village Level	1	1	In Chakka village Tool Bank established and this unit is equipped with Maize Sheller – 1 set, Power Spray battery with sprayer- 2 sets, LUBI Ect. The established tool bank is maintaining a separate register recording details of farmers hiring tools and returning back. In the register is also maintain records of charges levied from farmers and maintaining the repairing cost. This facility has been enhancing farmer's knowledge & capacity to use modern techniques in agricultural activities.
Construction of vermin compost pits	23	23	Total 23 vermin compost pits measuring 10x6x3 double bedded vermin pits constructed. After 3 months from each

			vermin pit 5 quintals of manure are produced at average sale cost ranging from Rs.6,000/- to Rs.7,000/-.
Promotion of intensive vegetable cultivation (broccoli, onion)	151	151	In 09 villages 151 marginal farmers have been supported to cultivate vegetables. The farmers after training by ATMA, received seeds of broccoli, bhutta brinjal, chili, tomato, kaddu, nenua, chichra etc. which they sowed in 33 acres of lands for this purpose. They are expected to earn Rs.20,000/- to Rs.25,000/- per acre.
Promotion of high yielding maize cultivation	200	200	200 marginal farmers from 10 villages cultivated maize in 70 acres land. The farmers were oriented by ATMA and learned the technique. The selected farmers were supported with 3 kg hybrid maize seeds. Increased production will be 25% to 30% leading to higher income.

The beneficiaries have constructed shed for the goats by their own contribution.

The machines such as grinding, heating, packaging and branding of products provided to the members. Community Enterprise Development through Mushroom Cultivation	4	4	20 women from 04 cluster, 05 women from each village, the villages Chakka, Rasidpur, Chiranjiwipur and Rani have been trained by the BTM, ATMA & resource person Geeta Devi both theoretical and practical learning sessions. Just after the training to 20 women 100 bags of mushrooms provided to them for practical experimental purpose. Later on each woman received 25 bags of mushrooms for cultivation purpose.
Cattle feed production with SHGs members	1	1	This is one of prosperous intervention started by the women assessing the need of fodder for the cattle locally available with quality. As in the area majorities of populations are involved in agriculture and allied activities. Rearing of cattle and selling milk is one of the lucrative earning sources for the villagers. Marketing and branding of products done and the

			women who have started individual enterprises would sell fodder from their units and income level will increase. Cattle Feed Production unit is established in Chakka Village. There are 15 women from Sadhna SHGs started the activities. For equipping the production unit machineries, packaging machines, raw materials, electric connection and shed construction completed. Agreement for production unit is done and meetings of VDCs and Production units are regularly held. This unit is named after “Bhagirath Cattle Food Production Unit”
Capacity Building of existing CBO/ User Group (Irrigation Committee)	5	5	Solar Based Group Irrigation Committees participated from the 05 villages. From each village 07 irrigation committees had attended in the capacity building training. Technical expert team oriented the Irrigation Committee Members on repair and maintenance of Solar Irrigation Pumps. The members given input to provide water facilities to other farmers by charging nominal amount and deposit in the Irrigation Committee fund for future maintenance cost. In the training 35 members from 07 members from Irrigation Committees had participated from villages Rani, Suro, Begumsarai, Jhamatiya, & Alampur Kanho.
VDCs/KVSs Training & Stationary Support	15	15	In all the 15 villages VDC/KVS members were oriented on shouldering responsibilities of the programmes implemented. The motto is that after the project handed over to the villagers, they may discharge their responsibilities for taking care of the assets created in the villages and take initiative to tab government schemes and benefits.
Skill training on Stitching & dress Making	1	1	From April, 2023 to March, 2024 131 women and girls have completed their training. Out of them 38 are women who have purchased sewing machines and opened tailoring shop at their villages. Besides another 31 girls have purchased sewing machines and started sewing clothes. 53% of the trained women and girls are engaged in tailoring and earning. The remaining girls are going to purchase machines. Presently 40 women and girls have enrolled their names and learning the trade.
Improving Health & Nutritional Practices among adolescent girls	15	15	There were 352 adolescent girls, AWWs-17, ANMs-14, ASHA-9, VDCs Members-19, Pregnant & Lactating Mothers-30 (Total 441 participants had attended the training). In the orientation/training the following points discussed in detail: 1. Obtaining nutrition from locally available green vegetables, fruits 2. Exhibition of fruits & vegetables 3. Weight & Height Measurement 4. Intake of folic acid tablets 5. Practical demonstration of obtaining nutrition through painting competition
Promotion of kitchen garden among adolescent girls	200	200	In the Kishori Samuh group meeting discussed in detail about the activity to grow nutrition garden. The girls were provided 07 types of vegetable seeds for cultivation. They learned to grow different vegetables for food to become healthier.

Organizing Health Camps at village level	17	17	In 17 villages Health Camps were organized and 1265 patients were treated. They include male, female, adolescent girls, children, and pregnant mothers. During the health camps 433 BP tests and 575 sugar tests conducted. The patients were given medicines and tests at free of cost. The community conceptualized timely treatment, maintaining good health and their support from PHC Bachhwara ensured.
Organizing livestock health camp at village level	16	16	From 433 families, total 1619 animals were treated and 1228 animals were dewormed through 16 animal health camps. The community have been sensitized on seasonal diseases of animals, precaution and care and even if animals fell sick, immediate diagnose from Pashu Sakhi. They were apprised on better upkeep of animals and quality feeding process.
Organizing Nutrition Mela with ICDS	1	1	“Nutritional Mela with ICDS” organized in Anganwadi Centre No: 199 of Chiranjipur Village. The event was inaugurated by the Chief Guest Mr. Abhisekh Raj, BDO, Bachhwara by lighting the lamp. In this event Ms. Sangita Kumari, CDPO, Bachhwara, Dr. Ram Krishna, MOIC, CHC Bachhwara, Ms. Priyanka Kumari, BCM, CHC Bachhwara, Md. Imran, BHM, CHC Bachhwara, Mukhiya, Sarpanch, 22 Anganwadi Workers, Mothers, Adolescent Girls and Children had participated. In the event total of 236 persons sensitized on food nutrition.
Construction of soak pit near hand pumps	60	60	60 Soak pits constructed among 60 families near handpumps to prevent water logging and keep the place hygienic and germ free.
Renovation of hand pump & construction of soak pit and hand pump platform	4	4	From Saving Plan renovation of hand pumps, construction of soak pit and platform near hand pumps constructed for 04 families. This activity enabled the family members to keep in and around the hand pump clean. There is no water stagnation and children are safe. Moreover, less waste of detergent while cleaning clothes. LIC Housing Finance Ltd. UDHYAM Project

The organisation partnered with LIC Housing Finance Ltd to provide employment to 320 marginalised women and girls after providing skill development in the desired and locally demanding trades. The trades are Cook- Indian Cuisine, Assistant Electrical Technician, Hospitality-Assistant General Attendant and Assistant Computer Operator. The intervention areas were 5 villages each of aspirational districts Godda and Sahibganj in Jharkhand state.

Target Beneficiaries: 320 Young women and girls in the age group (15 to 35) year belonging to STs, SCs, OBCs, Minority and Economically Weaker Section.

JAN SHIKSHAN SANSTHAN, MOTIHARI and SITAMARHI

Jan Shikshan Sansthan aims to provide vocational training to illiterates, neo-literates as well as school drop-outs in rural areas by identifying skills that have a relevant market in the areas. The organisation is operating JSS in Motihari and Sitamarhi with the support of Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship, Government of India. JSS Motihari is operational since February, 2009 and JSS Sitamarhi is operational since July, 2021. Till the end of financial year 2023-24, Motihari Centre has skilled about 21,800 women and youths whereas Sitamarhi Centre has skilled 4500 women and youths and has employed /self-employed thousands of them. Many of them are private employees while many of the male entrepreneurs are working in gulf countries as Technicians. Many of these entrepreneurs opened business enterprises and became **“Self-Dependent”**.

The objective of the JSS is to uplift this rural population economically by imparting essential skills training, thereby enabling local trades to grow creating new opportunities for the natives of the area.

- Livelihood cell encouraged for the beneficiaries for self and wage employment and linkages with national / state portal for promotion of employment and job melas etc.

- Courses having NSQF Compliant which has production, service and IT oriented.
- Life Enrichment Education, Digital Literacy, Personality Development are part of Skill Training.

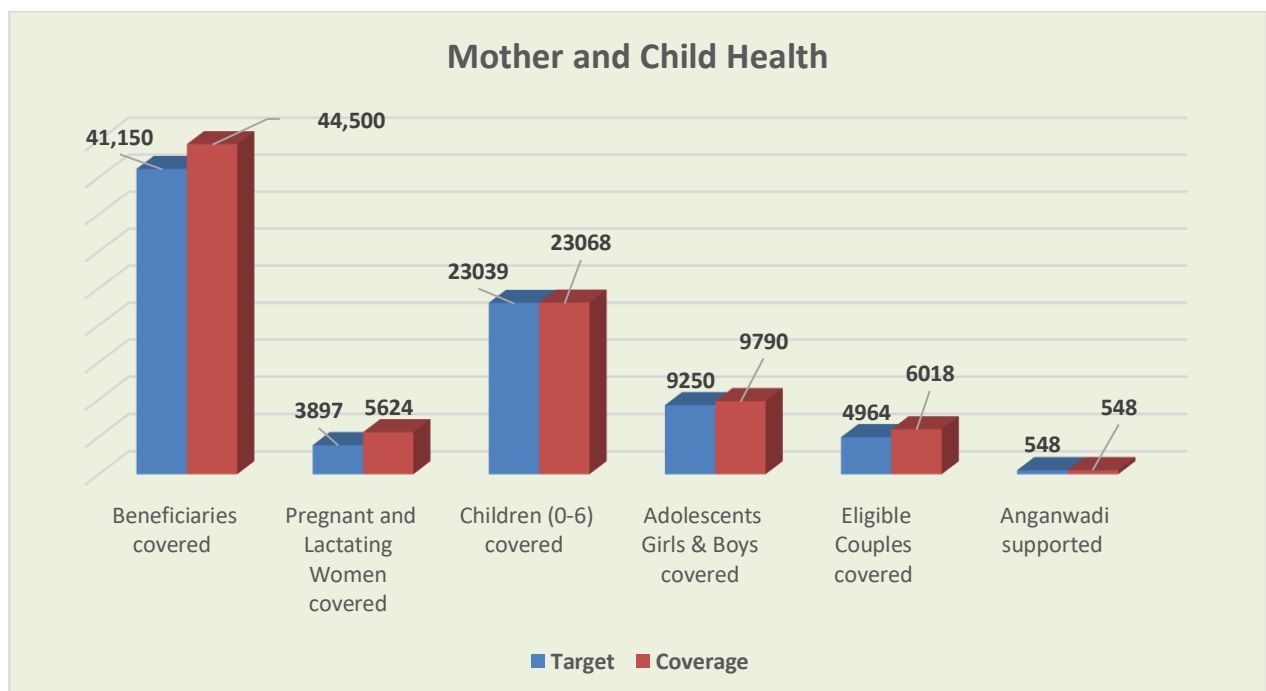

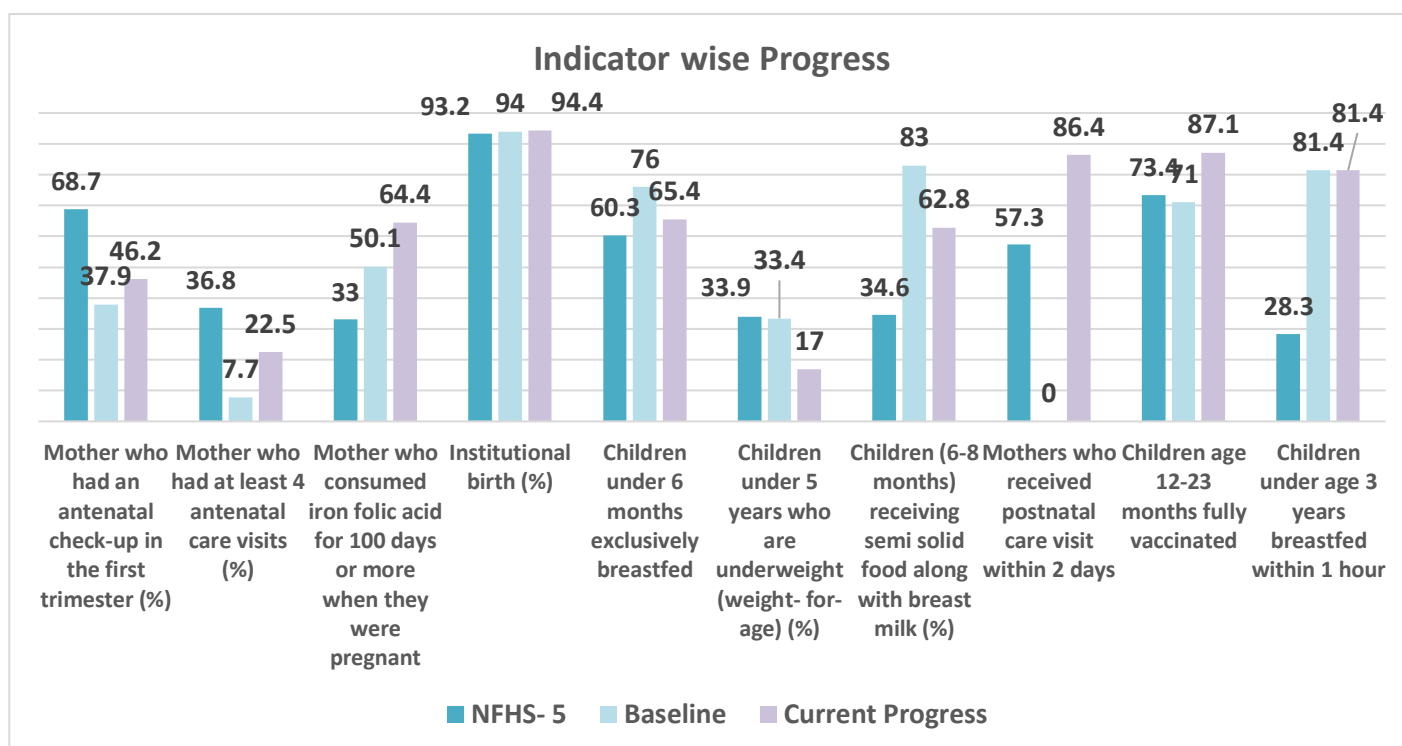

Vihaan - Care Support Centre

HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, is one of the world's most serious public health challenges. But there is a global commitment to stopping new HIV infections and ensuring that everyone with HIV has access to HIV treatment. There were approximately 38.4 million people across the globe with HIV in 2021. Of these, 36.7 million were adults and 1.7 million were children (<15 years old). In addition, 54% were women and girls. An estimated 1.5 million individuals worldwide acquired HIV (**New HIV Infections**) in 2021, marking a 32% decline in new HIV infections since 2010. **HIV Testing**—Approximately 85% of people with HIV globally knew their HIV status in 2021. The remaining 15% (about 5.9 million people) did not know they had HIV and still needed access to HIV testing services. HIV testing is an essential gateway to HIV prevention, treatment, care, and support services.

HIV Treatment Access—As of the end of 2021, 28.7 million people with HIV (75%) were accessing antiretroviral therapy (ART) globally. That means 9.7 million people are still waiting. HIV treatment access is key to the global effort to end AIDS as a public health threat. People with HIV who are aware of their status, take ART as prescribed, and get and keep an undetectable viral load can **live long and healthy lives** and **will not transmit HIV to their HIV-negative partners through sex**. **NIRDESH is running Care Support Centre at Motihari (East Champaran, Bihar)** since June, 2013. **Care Support Centre** is responsible for strengthening family and community care through psycho-social support to the individuals, more particularly to the marginalized women and children affected by the epidemic, improving the availability, accessibility and affordability of ART treatment to the poor, promote high level of drug adherence (95%) and address stigma and discrimination associated with the epidemic.

Targeted Intervention Project

It is estimated that more than 90% of HIV transmission in India is related to unprotected sexual intercourse or sharing of injecting equipment between an infected and an uninfected individual. Much of the HIV transmission in India occurs within groups or networks of individuals who have higher levels of risk due to a higher number of sexual partners or the sharing of injection drug equipment. To combat HIV transmission among High-Risk population Targeted Intervention Project is implemented with the support of State AIDS Control Society since 2015. **Presently there are 829 HRGs active population in which FSWs are 672 and MSMs are 157.**

NIRDESH has brought in significant change among the lives of 829 High Risk Groups. An ambitious treatment target of 95:95:95 setup to end HIV epidemic by 2025 is implemented across all services.

Objectives- To reach to the targeted communities with basic services such as Referral/Linkage related to HIV/AIDS services, Management of STI, BCC, Condom promotion, Enabling Environment building and community mobilisation.

Strategies- Outreach, Training, BCC, STD treatment, referral to services ICTC, PPTCT, ART, DOT centre, RMCs, Presumptive treatment, Community based screening, counselling, condom demo, distribution and social marketing of condoms, FGD, IEC knowledge dissemination, nukkad-natak, advocacy, networking, reducing discrimination, PLHA livelihood, social welfare scheme linkages etc.

Link Worker Scheme

Link Worker Scheme is a programme to reduce HIV/AIDS epidemic to zero in the country. The scheme sponsored by BSACS started in Darbhanga district from January, 2012. One of the Key Salient features of LWS aims to enhance Community Participation, building a sense of ownership and takes in to enable the scheme to be sustained beyond the programme. The report describes the progress ending March 31, 2023. There are 609 HRGs, 679 Truckers, 24147 Migrants, 313 (PLHIV & CLHIV), 2602 ANC mothers, 504 TB suspected and 28134 other vulnerable. To minimize risk of HIV/AIDS in the district and to facilitate health services 21 block/district level advocacy meeting, 40 stakeholders' meetings and 104 community events have been arranged. Moreover, 16 health camps organized, 1028 on board volunteers mobilized community and supported clients in visiting ICTC/FICTC/STD Clinic/DOT Centre.

CHILD EDUCATION & CHILD PROTECTION

GIRL CHILD EDUCATION PROJECT

NIRDESH, in joint collaboration with IIMPACT, provides educational opportunity to girls, from socially and economically disadvantaged communities of Bihar, who traditionally have no access to schooling. Our aim is to break the cycle of illiteracy that girls from such communities are mired in. This is done through 68 local community-based Learning Centers, where they get meaningful and stimulating education up to Class 5 and are guided to their entry into mainstream education. 48 Learning centres are operational in Paliganj block in Patna district and 20 Learning centres are in Jhanjharpur and Laukaha/Khutauna blocks of Madhubani district. Educating girls will induce knowledge of social skills, problem-solving, and critical thinking in them.

Apart from education, children are involved in multiple activities such as event celebration, community awareness, cultural activities, games, yoga and meditation. Class monitors visit absentee children's homes with teachers to bring them back to the LC. 2040 girl children are educated through 68 teachers. After passing out from class 5, 738 children were mainstreamed into upper primary level. 640 girls from 64 Aarambh Munch were promoted as activists to prevent child marriage and child labour as social evils and about 17 child marriages stopped.

68 Centre Management Committee conducted 816 meetings with parents and teachers where about 70-75% of parents participated regularly in improving the children's progress and further improvement /support/linkages recommendations incorporated. LCs teachers regularly get the feedback of the mainstream children from their school teachers followed by home visits so as to ensure retention in schools.

ENSURING ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR CHILDREN

Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation (KSCF) joined hands to work together to provide legal support and care to the trafficked children and prevention of Child marriages in Muzaffarpur district and thereby ensure access to justice for the children in F.Y. 2022-23 where we lodged 19 FIRs against child trafficking. A total of 06 traffickers were arrested. 56 children (girls 09, boys 47) were rescued from trafficking. A special drive conducted against child traffickers celebrating the birthday of Indian Activist Nobel Laureate Mr. Kailash Satyarthi in which 05 child traffickers were arrested. Meetings are conducted with child related allied systems such as stakeholders CWC, RPF/GRPF, Station Masters and other government service providers. Moreover, awareness and sensitization meetings were conducted across all domains to contribute protection to the children. We held a district wise campaign against "Child Marriage" in which 11,800 community members and stakeholders took pledge from 109 villages of 06 districts, namely Muzaffarpur, East Champaran, Sitamarhi, Madhubani, Patna and Darbhanga. They conducted a Candle March and a Placard rally, took Pledge. In the meantime, we prevented 05 child marriages.



Recognizing our sincere efforts and services to the distressed children, partnership strengthened to initiate "Access to Justice for Children Programme phase 2" in Muzaffarpur district in F.Y. 2023-24. In this financial year, we envisage to work on Prevention of Child Marriage and Child Labour / Child Trafficking through community mobilisation, pledges at 03 levels individual, family, community and Village Stakeholders like Sarpanch/Mukhiya, individual undertaking, lodging FIR against child marriage followed by support services. Similarly, rescue, restore, care and support and rehabilitation of child victim and arresting of traffickers, employer, accused etc.

2,63,448 Child marriage stopped instrumenting undertakings and pledges (group pledge, family pledge, individual pledge and stakeholders pledge). 2,63,448 pledges against child marriage includes (2,59,920 groups pledge, 3,094 families pledge, 401 individual person pledge and 33 stakeholders (sarpanch/mukhiya) pledge) and 256 family undertaking done across 150 villages in the district. NIRDESH believe that the best way to stop child marriage is to keep children engaged in schools / education till they attain the legal marriage age. Purposely, we campaign for "LETS MARCH TO SCHOOL" in every village, listed out 119 dropout and out of school children and submitted the list to respective school headmaster, BEO,

DEO and DM. 05 girls had already got admitted. Moreover, 59 child labour/child trafficking related FIR lodged in police stations, 89 children rescued and 87 traffickers/accused/employer arrested.

CHILDLINE 1098 SERVICE



CHILDLINE 1098 is a phone number that spells hope for millions of children across India. It is a 24-hour a day, 365 days a year, free, emergency phone service for children in need of aid and assistance. We reach out to every child in need of care and protection by responding to all calls on CHILDLINE 1098 and through interventions and also link them to relevant services for their long-term care and rehabilitation. CHILDLINE 1098 is operational in 573 districts across the nation.

CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) is the nodal agency of the Ministry of Women and Child Development for setting up, managing and monitoring the CHILDLINE 1098 service all over the country. We partnered with CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) in 2011 as collaborative agency to run CHILDLINE 1098 in Muzaffarpur and gradually the partnership strengthened relationship operating CHILDLINE 1098 as collaborative agency in East Champaran from 2016 and CHILDLINE HELP DESK at Muzaffarpur railway station from 2018. In F.Y. 2023-24, we worked for just 03 months (April to June) and as per CHILDLINE India Foundation direction the programme handed over to District Child Protection Units. During this short period, we connected to 108 children in 02 districts providing them protection, care and support services.

SPECIALIZED ADOPTION AGENCY (SAA)

Specialized Adoption Agency (SAA) is a centrally sponsored scheme under the Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS) run through the Government - Civil Society Partnership. NIRDESH, under the guiding principle of the State Social Welfare Department/ State Child Protection Society, has run and has managed Shishu Greha or SAA in Motihari, East Champaran since October, 2016. The prime objective of the program is to care & protection of orphans/abandoned/ destitute infants or children

up to 6 years and to promote their in-country, inter-country, adoption; adoption from institutional care to non-institutional/family care in the best interest of the children.

Specialized Adoption Agency (SAA) is a 10 bedded home where such children live in homely environment nursed by 6 maids with mother touch and care. Here children enjoy learning and growing with varieties of toys. From inception October, 2016 to 31st March, 2024, we cared for 88 children brought up in the utmost mother's touch and affection. They were regularly provided with a medical check-up by a paediatric doctor and when needed medical treatment. Children lived in good health. 37 children have been legally adopted by families to In-country and Inter-country. 27 children were rehabilitated, 14 children transferred to other SAAs, 3 children died while 7 children (2 girls, 5 boys) are currently residing in the home.

Success Story of Ms. Kiran Devi

Kiran Devi the wife of shri Modi Yadav resident of Mohalla Pakur Road, Sarkanda, Godda, Jharkhand. She lives with her in laws. Her husband is a casual wage earner.

She was very worried about bread earning. She wanted to earn money but how and where? She was neither educated nor had any type of technical skill. She first thought to do agricultural activities by taking land on share cropping, but then agriculture was more based on rain water and therefore that may not be profitable business. She left that idea.

In the meantime, project field coordinator contacted her, briefed about the LIC HFL Technical Training courses being provided free of cost. Moreover, she will also get support materials for the training. Immediately, her mind struck to open Dhaba after training which may establish permanent business for assured livelihood and income. Her husband will also get engaged and both of them together started running the Dhaba maintaining area clean and provided hygienic & tasty food to the customer. So, she enrolled her name in Assistant Cook-Indian Cuisine Trade.

She learned and prepared different dishes both in the training and at home. And as soon as her training completed, she began searching for a location to setup Dhaba and arrange money for the operational cost.

Her struggle paid her and she got right location to setup Dhaba. She opened the name of Dhaba named “**Shravan Dhaba**” and inaugurated on 21st September, 2023.

After one month approx. her income was Rs. 17,500. In the month of March, 2024, she earns profit Rs. 24,000.

She is extremely happy. She has all thanks for LIC HFL and NIRDESH as she comments, “**They have changed our life**”. At times she depended on husband’s money and had to curtail needs every day and now she has money in hand always and she can utilize as per her needs. She takes care and fulfill needs of in-laws too.

Success Story of Ms. Pinki Kumari

Introduction:-

- Pinki Kumari is the wife of Kamlesh Kumar. She has a son Amarjit Kumar. He is 8 years old and he is studying in Government school Mahadeoganj. She lives in her father's house At- Godhi tola, Po- Mahadeoganj, District- Sahibganj, Pin- 816109, Jharkhand since last 6-7 months. Her husband used to torture her mentally and often harmed physically. When her husband brutality increased, she decided to live with her parent.

Employment and Career building: -

- She came to know about NIRDESH LIC HFL project when Field Coordinator visited her house and described about the project motto and provision for vocational skills in 04 trades without any charges. Field Coordinator counselled her about Basic Electrical courses and more career-opportunity in this trade locally. FC said that they will try to get her employed after training through Rojgar Mela. FC also said that if she wishes then she can also start own electrical shop for which Mudra loan could be taken. She then decided to join this course. Next day, she came to the office and took admission in Basic Electric.



- She learned domestic wiring, LED bulb repairing, board making, switch and bulb fitting, and other electrical equipment's servicing.
- She took the training not for grant but made it for assured livelihood because those days she was fully dependent on her parents. She worked hard during training to become a perfect Electrician. She was confident, after completing the training, and emerge as Master Electrician and she will get job in any of the MSME agency or if not, she will open her own electrical shop through Bank loan.

Opportunity: -

- The training was provided free of cost
- Books and learning materials provided free of cost
- Training Centre was at convenient place.
- Electrician has great opportunity to get employed, work as freelance contractor or run own business.
- Her confidence was her strength which enabled her improve financial condition

Employment:

- Although her first choice was to open Electrical Shop but parents said before taking risk in opening shop it will be better to make market, explore possibility and earn some money by working as freelancer. She then contacted wholesalers, traders in blocks and districts sale of

made items like electrical board of different sizes. After assurance she began making electrical board of different sizes and supplied to the shops.

- She now earns Rs. 400/- to Rs. 500/- per day by board making and supply to shops. Averagely she earns Rs. 12,000/- to Rs. 15,000/- per month. She has been saving money so that a good electrical shop can be opened that help to sustenance income.
- She is much delighted and happy. She says, **“ALL THANKS TO LIC HFL, NIRDESH AND LIC HFL UDHYAM PROJECT”** which totally changed her life. She is self- dependent and self-decision maker.

Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari makes future bright, Says Tannu Kumari

I am Tannu Kumari, 23 years old, daughter of Shri Sukeshwar Ram, belong to Schedule Caste. I live with my family at Village-Lakshmipur, Nayi ka tola, P.S.-Raghunathpur, District – Purbi Champaran. We are five brother and sisters, of which I am elder. My father is a daily wage labourer and therefore his average monthly income is Rs. 9000/-. In this little earning, he could not meet out basic needs and I personally was very anxious. I have seen his hard work and realized that he had to struggle for caring and developing us to his best. I wanted to help my father by earning money and for this I tried to find options.



One day, APO Ms. Madhu Kumari came in my village and all of a sudden, she met me and asked to gather few girls nearby for a meeting. I gathered about 10 girls nearby. She after introduction, introduced about different trades running in Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari and also suggested girls to get skill development in Beauty Care Assistant, Dress Making, Basic Computer for a certain period and they could start earning. She added that for SCs, training is totally free, and after receiving training they will get the certificate which is accepted by all agencies for employment. Moreover, Banks provide loan for running business. She also detailed about the documents required for admission in any of the trade and shared her contact number.

After 2-3 days, I step in Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari and met her. I enrolled myself in Beauty Care Assistant. With the start of training class, I received training regularly with sincerity and dedication. I enjoyed training classes and completed training. I appeared in the assessment and secured A+ grade and then I received certificate.

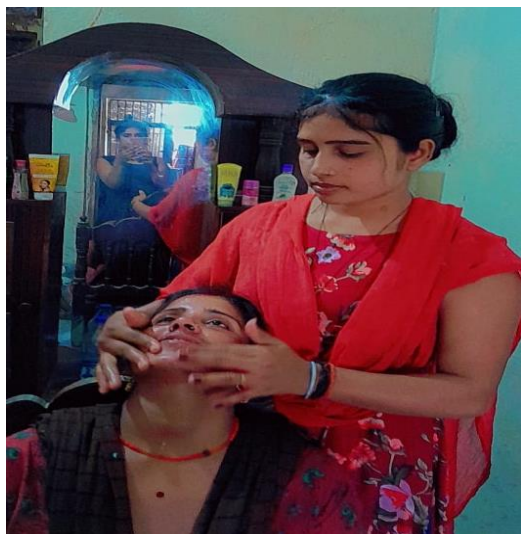
My father took a loan amount of Rs. 10000/- for me and gave me for startup Beauty Parlour. I purchased parlour chair, mirrors and all toolkits and established centre. I then moved house to house and invited young women and girls for service. Gradually, many customers reached to me whom I greeted nicely and served them to their satisfaction. In 02 months, I repaid loan amount and these days I earn Rs. 10000/- approx. per month.

I am very happy and satisfied. I am happy I shoulder my father financially. I also save money for future.

Nidhi Kumari Carved Her Future

I am Nidhi Kumari, 22 years old, is a resident of Village + Post – Hardiya, Police Station-Raghunathpur, District-



Purbi Champaran. I have 02 brothers and 03 sisters and my father is a daily wage labour. Somehow, I received education and completed Intermediate. My father did not earn so much that family basic needs could be fulfilled and so myself and my mummy were very anxious and felt uneasy. I was looking to do something but what to do, was a challenge.

Meanwhile, staff from Jan Shikshan Sansthan visited my house and during interaction, she (APO) suggested to get skill development in Beauty Care Assistant Course at minimal course fee which will open way for earning money locally, even you can start this business from home just investing Rs.4000-Rs.5000. This amount is not much and you can easily arrange to start a business.

In the evening, I discussed with parents on the Beauty Care Assistant Course training for earning money. They all agreed and with my mother, the next day I step in Jan Shikshan Sansthan where we were warmly greeted. PO Sir and APO Mam, had introductory sessions on my hobby, my attitude and my interest in education and skill development and about employment. They also narrated about various trades with their scopes. I liked to enroll in Beauty Care Assistant Course. My mom and myself did enrolment formalities and then PO sir called Trainer- Beauty Care Assistant for my exposure in her class. In the class my teacher introduced me with trainees who welcomed and greeted me warmly. After a brief introduction and exposure with the theoretical and practical class, I returned home.

From next day, on regular basis, I attended class for total 3.5 months and after passing assessment, I received certificate. I then, met girls and young women house to house for customer. Meanwhile, I established small Beauty Parlour at home and started work. Gradually, I got customers whom I greeted nicely and did my job sincerely. My customer got satisfied and praised my work. In the recent wedding season, I earned Rs. 12000/- to Rs. 14000/- per month. I am hopeful that in lean season I will be earning around Rs.10000/- a month. 50% of my earning goes to meet family needs, 25% on raw materials and 25% on saving.

She says, “Main khush hoon, main atmnirbhar ban gae hoon” lekin “iska shrey main Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari ko deti hoon, jiske sahyog se hamari aarthik samasyaen door hui hai”. Ritu Devi Carved Her Future

I, Ritu Devi, 28 years old is a resident of Village+Post- Khajuriya, P.S. Dumariya, Block-Kesariya, District-Purbi Champaran. My husband’s name is Shri Dilip Giri. He is a private employee. We belong to a middle-class family. We have one son and two daughters. Children education and household expenditure met with difficulty. The financial crisis worried me in particular. I thought if I too can earn money, that will be very helpful for us. I could not find the source.

Meanwhile my friend told me about Skill Training in Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari which provide skill training at village level for self-employment. It also supports in establishing enterprise through nationalized banks, other Micro-finance institutes.

I discussed with husband about the skill training from “Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari”. He said, it is better to visit the “Sansthan” and see what best possible skill you can have. I came in “Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Motihari” and talked to APO Ms. Munni Sharma about my problem and means to get rid from financial crisis. She after introduction, described about various trades where skill training is provided. I thought over and asked certain information from husband with regard to tailor and beauty parlour. I then decided to get skill in Beauty Care Assistant Course, and enrolled myself. She then said the date, time, class duration and place of start of training. The training centre was near to my village. With the start of class, I regularly attained classes with sincerity and dedication. I completed my course, gave assessment and received certificate. Soon, I established beauty parlour at home and contacted customers in the neighbour.



Gradually, I got customers whom I greeted nicely and did my job sincerely. My customer got satisfied and praised my work. In the recent wedding season, I earned Rs. 12000/- to Rs. 14000/- per month. I am hopeful that in lean season I will be earning around 10000/- a month. 50% of my earning goes to meet family needs, 25% on raw materials and 25% on saving.

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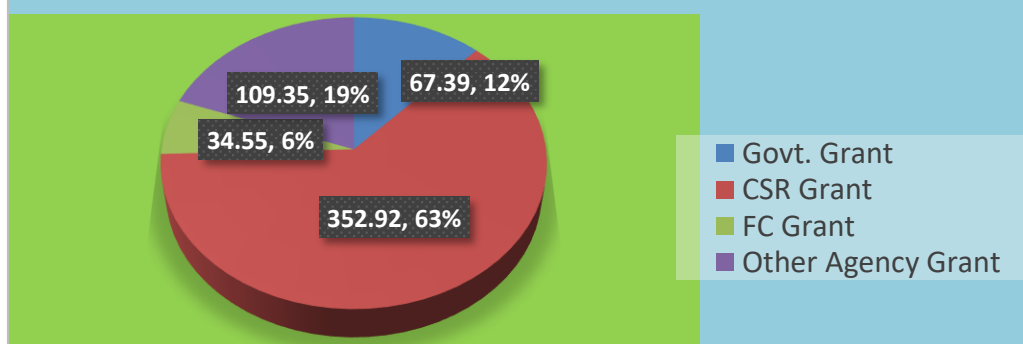

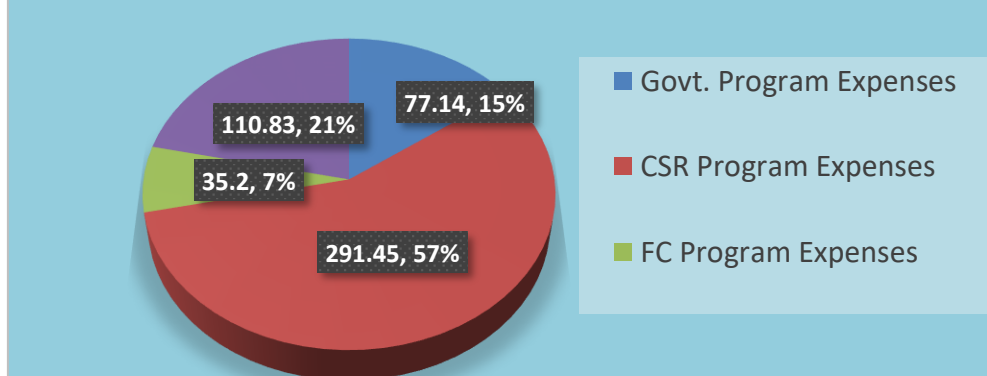

Grant Received in Rs. Lakh

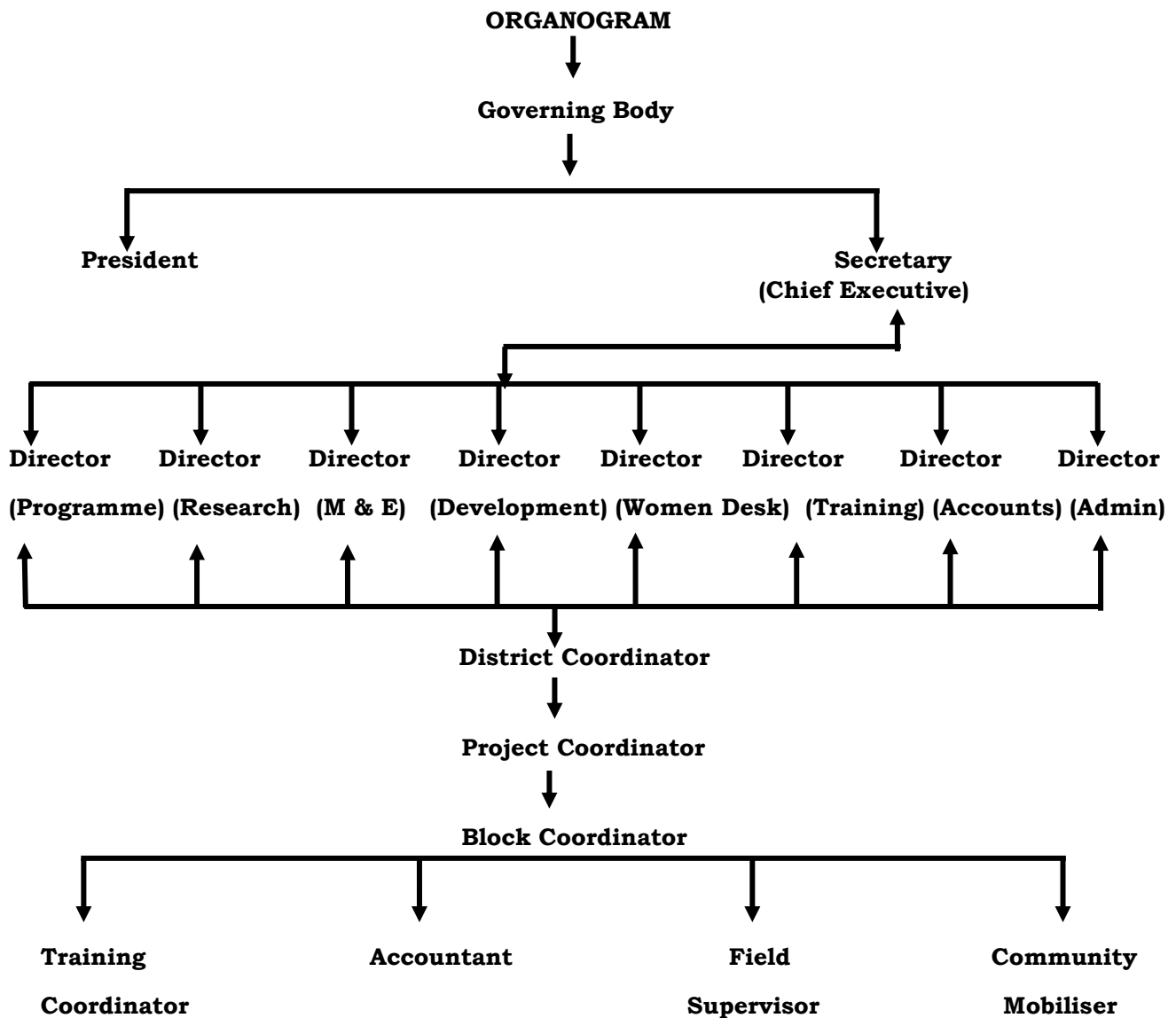


Program Expenses in Rs. Lakh
